Susana Chacón Domínguez is Head of the Research and Development Department at Tecnológico de Monterrey, Campus Santa Fe in Mexico City where she is also Professor of International Studies. Appointed as Secretary General to the Mexican Chapter of the Club of Rome since 2000, she has a BSc in International Affairs (Universidad Iberoamericana), along with specialties in international negotiation (Harvard University) and U.S.-Mexico relationship (U.C.S.D.). Besides having graduate degrees on Economics and International Politics (CIDE, MSc), Public Administration (Harvard Kennedy School of Government, MSc), History (Universidad Iberoamericana, PhD) and International Affairs (Georgetown University, post PhD), she has been Professor and Researcher in other institutions: (Tecnológico de Monterrey Campi Ciudad de México and Santa Fe and Universidad Iberoamericana) as well as guest researcher and visiting scholar to a number of higher education institutions (Colegio de México, Georgetown University, Harvard and CIDE).

Professor Chacón has written extensively about the Formulation of Mexican Foreign Policy and US-Mexican relation in books such as *Between globalization and dependence: Mexican foreign policy 1994-2002*; *Energy, narcotics and finance: the hidden face of Mexican foreign policy, 2002*; *Mexico and the US 1940-1955, The conflict of cooperation:: The cases of military, trade and Bracero agreements*; and *México: One country, four scenarios*. Her more recent book is: *The Oil crisis in Mexico, 2008*. She has also contributed to classic international affairs discussions in books such as *Diplomatic negotiation: A Forgotten Art?*, 2003 Her current research projects focus on oil, US-Mexican relation and Mexican foreign policy as well as conflict resolution and scenario analysis.
